

A Reflection for Today: Manger

Away in a Manger, No Crib for a Bed is probably one of the first carols children learn. Babies sleep in cribs, cradles, baskets, boxes, drawers and so on, but Jesus was wrapped in 'swaddling clothes' (narrow strips of cloth) and laid in a manger, which was, we presume, in a stable. The stable could have been a cave under a dwelling and the manger was a trough designed to hold animal food. Now, a star shape marks the place where it is thought the birth happened, inside the Church of the Nativity, which stands next to busy 'Manger Square' in Bethlehem. What is the significance of the manger? Well, it was the most lowly of births, in which the Son of God identified with the humble and poor, as he continued to do throughout his life. Also the manger offered food to animals and so was a sign that God was offering food for our souls and reminding us that Jesus is the only one who can truly satisfy the hunger of our hearts.

A Reflection for Today: Herod

On 9 December, it was reported that new sections of **Herod's** hilltop fortress, Herodium, near Jerusalem, have been newly opened to the public. Herod the Great, as he was known, reigned over Judea from 37 – 4 BC as a client-king of Rome. Because of his father's popularity with Julius Caesar, he was able to build extravagantly, including massive extensions to the Temple in Jerusalem and palaces and fortresses, like Masada by the Dead Sea. Ordinary Jews were in awe. Jesus' disciples pointed out the Temple's splendours to him (Mark 13:1), but Jesus responded with a prophecy of its total destruction within a generation, fulfilled by the Romans in AD 70. All that remains now are the massive foundation stones, the 'Wailing Wall' where pious Jews pray. Herod was also infamous for cruelty and vanity. Even his relatives did not escape the sword, including three of his own sons. He would stop at nothing to protect the longevity of his dynasty. So the 'massacre of the innocents', recorded for us in Matthew 2:16-18, was entirely in keeping with his character. For people at the time, **Herod's** rule seemed 'great', if not invincible, yet history shows us that such greatness was only temporary. Daniel's visions are important here, because they show us that ultimately what matters is not the empires of men, but the kingdom of God and his Christ, the true 'Prince' (Daniel 9:25). It is God's covenant of grace, made with Abraham, that will win the day. It is spiritual values that pass the test of time, not political ambitions or naked power. As the Psalmist reminds us: 'Do not put your trust in princes, in human beings, who cannot save. When their spirit departs, they return to the ground; on that very day their plans come to nothing. Blessed are those whose help is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the Lord their God' (Psalm 146:3-5). Herod died a painful death from a dreadful disease in his late 60s and left his kingdom to his children, whose time on the political stage also came ultimately to naught, but Jesus is coming back to reign for ever! (Colin)

A Reflection for Today: Bethlehem

When we see the word **Bethlehem**, a town a few miles from Jerusalem, we associate it with Christmas and the birth of Jesus Christ. On Day 1 of our Advent Calendar, we were reminded of the prophecies that the Messiah would be born there - and Luke chapter 2 tells us of their fulfilment. What was **Bethlehem** like then? It seems that it was a large, stone-built village with over a thousand residents and was very fertile with a good water supply. What is **Bethlehem** like now? It's grown, of course, and is in a problem area, but in normal times is a tourist centre, with cafés and coaches and people queueing to enter the Church of the Nativity, built to mark the place of Christ's birth. It has a handicraft industry, as well as stone and concrete factories. **Bethlehem** is mentioned in carols like *O Little Town of Bethlehem* which says that 'the hopes and fears of all the years are met in you tonight' (i.e. in Bethlehem) and if we think of those words then it helps us to realise, even more, how very important Bethlehem is for us all.

Whilst we may not be able to get out to buy presents this year or meet with friends and family for a slap-up meal, may we focus more as a result on the real meaning of Christmas and rejoice that you stepped into our messy world to save us, Lord.

A Reflection for Today: Magi

Magi, wise men, sages – who were these men who went to worship and offer gifts to Jesus in Bethlehem? Magi - from where we get the word magician, were famous at that time, written about by various historians and also referred to in the book of Daniel (2:27 and 5:15). In the regions of Persia and Babylonia they functioned as priests, teachers and interpreters of dreams. They were skilled in philosophy and medicine, as well as astronomy and astrology. That is why they were thought of as wise men, and were held in great esteem. From the time of Daniel, who was exiled in Babylonia, they would have heard of the prophecy of a Messiah who would come one day for Israel (Daniel chapter 9 records a vision given to Daniel about this, including details of the timing). Therefore, when they were studying the night sky and something new and unusual there alerted them — they were ready. It motivated them to such an extent that they set off to travel to Jerusalem and later followed the star to **Bethlehem**. The only reason that there are often assumed to be three of them is because of their three gifts (Matthew 2:11), but it is possible that there would have been a large group of them, riding on horseback and with servants. The Gospel in a Christingle

The **Christingle** has its origins in a Moravian children's service held in a castle in Germany on Christmas Eve in 1747. Nowadays, churches all over the world make Christingles to remind them that Christ is the **light** who came into the world at Christmas. The Christingle orange represents **the world**. John reminds us that 'Jesus was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognise him. He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him' (John 1:10-11). The red ribbon of the Christingle represents **the blood of Jesus** which was shed for us so that our sins may be forgiven. 'But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from every sin' (1 John 1.7).



The fruits and sweets on the four skewers represent **God's gifts** to us, the fruits of the earth and the four seasons. 'As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease' (Genesis 8.22). The lighted candle, pushed into the centre of the orange, represents **Christ, the Light of the world**. 'He said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life" (John 8.12). (Colin)

(96:1), to the Magnificat, the Benedictus, the Gloria and the Nunc Dimittis of Luke's Gospel, to the Apostle Paul's rallying cry to the Church at Colossae 'Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom, teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord' (3:16), and, finally, to the last book of the Bible, Revelation, with its vision of heaven and innumerable hosts of angels singing the celestial equivalent of Handel's *Hallelujah Chorus* in praise of the Lamb (5:8-14, 19:6). If proof is needed that COVID-19 is of the devil, then its destruction of congregational hymnsinging and carolling is surely it! But please find some safe way this Christmas of singing carols, whether ancient or modern, in praise of Immanuel, even if it is only singing along to a CD. You owe it to yourself and to the Lord! A Reflection for Today: Shepherds

Shepherds are mentioned many times in the Bible. We read of Abraham, Moses and David all being shepherds, and Jesus is often referred to as 'The **Good Shepherd'**. At the time of Jesus, during the warmer part of year, shepherds would be outdoors all the time. Each morning they would call, and the flock of sheep and goats would follow them to pasture ground where the animals could graze. The shepherds would find a pool of water or a well for them to have a drink. In the evening they would count the animals and check their health. At night the shepherds would guard the sheep and goats in open folds, or shelter the flock in a cave where they could protect them from jackals and hyenas. A howl of a hyena could panic a flock and the calm reassuring voice of a shepherd would still them. Shepherds would have worn sheepskin over their tunics. Sandals protected their feet from sharp rocks and thorns, and they wrapped their heads in a woven woollen cloth. Among the things they carried was a sling, which was used to lob stones near the straying sheep or goats to frighten them back to the flock, or to drive off prowling wild animals. (Brenda)

A Reflection for Today: *Prophecy*

One of the amazing things about the birth of Jesus is the way it fulfilled Old Testament prophecies about the Messiah – the one who is to come. If you have ever sung Handel's Messiah, some of these words will be very familiar to you, and they are often read at Carol Services. A well-known passage is found in Micah 5:8 where it tells us that the Messiah would be born in **Bethlehem** and that he came from God and existed even before he was physically born. Later, in the New Testament, the early part of John agrees with this. Isaiah 7:14 tells of birth to a virgin which emphasises Jesus' sinlessness and divine origin. It also explains that he is God with us and among us and that he will show us what God the Father is like. Isaiah 9:6-7 tells us that the child is born for us and will give spiritual peace now, but physical peace and his reign will be in the future, and he is described as Wonderful, Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father and Prince of Peace.
