Janet now read for us: Isaiah 43, 14-28.

This is what the Lord says— your Redeemer, the Holy One of Israel:

"For your sake I will send to Babylon and bring down as fugitives all the Babylonians,

Alec shares his message: Connect.

In our church we now have an interim constitution which is a great help and guides us as to how we are to function so we all know where we are.

And of course more significant and even more all-embracing than that we have the Word of God and the Spirit of God in our hearts to guide us and to lead us. Reading the Word of God and listening to God's Spirit speaking to our hearts may lead us to the understanding that we need a reset.

We all know that it is sometimes necessary to do a reset. Like with my work mobile. Sometimes it behaves as if it's got indigestion because it has taken too much information, too many calls and too many needs on board in too short a period of time and needs a reset.

The same thing might happen with my desktop or with your laptop or whatever. Something is not working properly so after a while you go for a reset.

Normally speaking doing a reset doesn't mean throwing the device out and buying a new one. Often it means getting the device to recall the functions or data that it seems to have lost or whatever.

So here we are at last at the start line. We all know that the starter traditionally says, "On your marks. Set." So are we set to start? Sometimes there has to be a restart. When there is a restart the starter used to say once again, "On your marks. Set. Go." So metaphorically speaking are we ready to go?

In the passage that Janet so kindly read for us we read about a reset.

Isaiah 43:18 says: "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?"

As I read right at the beginning of the gathering the Bible tells us that God's mercies are new every morning. What God wants to do in our lives is fresh and new every day. Maybe it's new things in our marriages and families, new things in our hearts, new things in our relationship to Jesus Christ or just new things in general. God maybe teaches us something that we've never known before. He maybe takes us to places that were unexpected.

When we read the gospels, we find that where Jesus appears things begin to shake and this shaking is a good thing. In Matthew 21 we read when he entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, the whole city was shaking, saying who is this? And the crowds kept saying, "This is the prophet, Jesus of Nazareth." The entire city of Jerusalem was turned upside down when Jesus showed up. We know that an earthquake happened when Jesus was crucified. We know that an earthquake happened, when Jesus rose from the grave and the stone was rolled away. And this same Jesus is right here with us. Dynamite.

He has blessed us and is blessing us so that we can continue to do new things in our community here in Galligreaves and Wensleyfold and of course throughout the borough and further afield. I believe God has and is challenging us and is encouraging us to continue to trust Him as we move forward together; as we connect together with God and with one another.

How does God do new things in our lives? How does God do new things in our church? He says we have to forget the past. We have to forget it. Now I don't mean we shouldn't be holding a Remembrance Day service. I don't mean that we should stop remembering and not be thankful for all the way the Lord has led us so far. No. The Bible says: "Remember how the LORD your God led you all the way in the wilderness these forty years, to humble and test you in order to know what was in your heart, whether or not you would keep his commands."

The very first words the prophet says are, "Forget the former things."

Now really this shouldn't be difficult for us to grasp. Because many of us perhaps go into a different room or climb up the stairs to get something and when we reach the other room or have climbed the stairs we cannot remember why we came and what we came for. That's kind of par for the course so to speak when you are a little bit older.

But if we are honest with ourselves we probably have some junk in our past and in order to get in touch with our future, we cannot live in the past. We can learn from the past, but we cannot live in the past. This church has a very long history; like it began with God in 1895.Not one of us here today was there right at the beginning when God started it. Not even Barbara was here then! Even before I came here and then particularly but not only in the time before the pandemic broke out I learned as much as I could about the history of this church , about God's dealings with you and about your responses to what God was saying. The past is a great place to learn from. We may have some wonderful memories. But the past is a terrible place in which to live. If we live in the past we will never move forward on to where God is aiming to move us.

We know that God has some things to say to us today like He does every day and I hope that as we look at our spiritual journey, that our spiritual development, the greatest days of our heart for God and the greatest things God did in our lives were not five years ago, or ten years ago, but right now. I really hope that it is now and in the days ahead. Because I am in all humility absolutely certain that God is speaking to me and the leadership team of this church as I hope He is to each one of us and He is turning our hearts and lives upside down and inside out as He continues preparing us for the ongoing work of leading this church forward and we are waiting and looking to see what He is about to do. For we can do nothing; but with God all things are possible. There is nothing, absolutely nothing, which our God cannot do!

Speak and pray with Janet and Jane. Speak and pray with Colin and Tony. Speak and pray with me. We are your servants for Christ's sake; but what we are experiencing sometimes amazes us.

Sometimes my schedule recently has looked like an attempt to shovel up and move all the sand of the Sahara desert into the Atlantic or other oceans until I have once again realised that God actually put the sand there Himself for a purpose. So then I stopped trying to move the sand. I also stopped looking at the sand and aimed just to look at God. He is enough. He is everything to me. Well of course I've done this and known this experience before; but not like this; not in this way; not with this timing.

It's easy isn't to look back and say, "I remember when I did this and I remember when God ...", and that's awesome, but that's not where we live and we can't continue to live on former blessings or former disappointments. Maybe for some of us today, the greatest enemy to the future that God has for us is mistakes that we've made in the past. You can't run the race that is set before you if you're always looking over your shoulder at the past. It's easy to look back and say, "well you see, I've always been discouraged. How could life be different? I've made these mistakes. How could God love me? I've struggled in this area. I guess I'm always going to struggle here <u>because</u> I've always struggled here".

You know Jesus didn't hibernate amongst us; He lived and lives amongst us.

It's easy to look back into the past and if you're going to embrace new things, there are certain things in the kingdom of God we may have to forget about, at least not dwell on them, and not have them in the forefront of our hearts and minds.

In one translation we read: "But forget all that— it is nothing compared to what I am going to do" says God. That`s what God says in Isaiah 43:18 (NLT) He says: "But forget all that— it is nothing compared to what I am going to do; for I am about to do something new."

Are we connected to this? Are we relating to this? The simple question is, are we connected to Jesus? Is He living in our hearts? Is He Lord of our hearts? We have given Him once again week after week all authority over this church which is His body.

God says to you and to me; to us as individuals and to us as a church: "See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?" Well to see it we need faith; faith which is the assurance of things hoped for; the assurance of things not seen."

Maybe you look around here this morning and you see lots of empty chairs? Really! They are places waiting to be filled when God opens up the hearts of people in this borough to come here to worship Him. There are still 130,000 people in this borough of Blackburn with Darwen. They won't all fit in here. Only God can bring them here. Yes we have our strategies; yes we have our ideas; but let's put them on the back-burner so to speak. Let's make sure they are not burdening us down with often unnecessary planning meetings. Let's get together to pray and read the Word of God together. This is God's challenge to me and to you; to us all.

"If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land." (2 Chronicles 7:14)

The Lord Jesus Christ says: "I will build my church, and the gates of Hell will not overcome it." It is absolutely impossible to destroy the true church of God.

It won't be easy moving forward. It isn't easy. But we know for God's Word teaches us that what it calls our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen. For what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal (2 Corinthians 4:17)

"For I am about to do something new; see, I have already begun! Do you not see it? I will make a pathway through the wilderness. I will create rivers in the dry wasteland." Isaiah 43:19 (NLT)

You see I didn't need and I don't need to shovel all the sand of the Sahara to the ocean. For God is making a pathway through the wilderness; through the wilderness of our pride and excessive self-esteem, through the valleys of depression and anxiety. He is creating rivers in the dry wasteland of an area which is crying out for the water of Life, for Living Water.

So we forget the past, we do not dwell on the past, we anticipate what God is about to do and indeed has begun to do, and we see, perceive and build the kingdom of God under God here in these places where we are.

10 days ago as many of you know I attended the Evangelical Baptists Leadership Day at Gold Hill Baptist church in Buckinghamshire. I met together with over 200 ministers with whom with one exception I had previously had no contact. The exception was the pastor of the Gate Church in Reading, a member of the Baptist Union Council as a co-opted member of the core leadership team.

According to the Baptist Times in Reading in 2016 more than 700 people had prayed to give or rededicate their lives to Christ in the first 10 days of a mission outreach. This number then increased to more than 1,200.

The pastor believes what happened in Reading is transferable, as it's 'not a technique, it is not a programme; it is not a church growth plan but something holy from the Lord.'

"He says it is simply the empowering of ordinary believers to be able to share the gospel on the streets and that is where the power to transform our cities lies. If we will humble ourselves, not try and control it and allow the Holy Spirit to flow we will see incredible things on the streets of every city in this nation." He could have added, "and every borough".

Leaders in Reading had been meeting every week to pray for revival. It is through prayer in our pleading to God from the heart in showing our dependence on Him and the Spirit-filled and Godobedient teaching of the Word that each and every renewal movement and revival that has ever happened in God's church on earth has taken place and is continuing to take place.

You may not be able to run around Galligreaves or indeed any part of Blackburn or Darwin but you can pray; and I know you do pray. Pray to the Lord of the harvest that He will send workers into His harvest for the harvest is ready, it is all around us, but as we know, the workers are few.

Let's go back to Hebrews 11:1-2. You know where God says "Now faith is being sure of what we hoped for and certain of what we do not see. This is what the ancients were commended for." And then follows like a long list of the "ancients". Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses and the rest.

You see God has done it before. He has given His servants the faith they need to see, to perceive what He is doing and to wait and work for what He is doing. Do you remember the story of Abraham? Look with me at Hebrews 11: 8-12.

"By faith Abraham, when called to go to a place he would later receive as his inheritance, obeyed and went, even though he did not know where he was going. By faith he made his home in the Promised Land like a stranger in a foreign country; he lived in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God; and by faith even Sarah, who was past childbearing age, was enabled to bear children because she considered him faithful who had made the promise, and so from this one man, and he as good as dead, came descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and as countless as the sand on the seashore."

What do you say to that? God hasn't changed. He is still doing things like that. All over God's earth, God is working.

In my home village there is a lady who had some difficulties with her sight. Since birth she had had some real challenges. She was a pharmacist, so it was quite natural when I was collecting medicines that I was able to speak with her in her pharmacy where she told me about this. She said she had been to so many eye doctors and so on but one well-qualified optician had apparently at last been given the gift to identify the problem she had. Do you know what she then said? Like I went out and looked up at the night sky and for the first time I could see the stars clearly. She could see clearly what God had done! For the first time!

Maybe you and I have not been able to see what God is doing? I don't mean in the heavens but on the earth. Maybe you are beginning to see that for the first time this morning?

Can you imagine Abraham's conversation with his wife at breakfast time as he let her know they were going to move? "Am I going to get to live in my dream house this time?" Is that what Sara said? OK Ab where are we going this time? Like we seem to have a really nomadic lifestyle... And Abraham says to his wife "I have no idea where we are going but God says we are to go, so we go."

I have a blank piece of paper in my hand. There is nothing written on it. When God says to the members at BBC "Do this, do that", He also says, "I am with you wherever you go." But we have to be following Him first.

Do we need a reset? Are we connected to the living God? Are we growing together as a praying, biblebelieving fellowship?

Or do we say what God did for Moses, what God did for Joshua, what God did for Gideon, what God did for Daniel indeed what God did for all these followers of His is really fine, but He can't or won't do that anymore. No, no, no; God has not changed. He is waiting for us to continue to trust Him as we move forward; He is encouraging us to look at the fields, to see the harvest, to pray for workers and to perceive, to understand the new thing that He is doing here.

Did you enter this building this morning with a spirit of hope and expectation? God, do something in me today. God, speak to me. Change me. Do something in our church today, God. We're not looking back at the past. We've got to forget it; we are not to dwell on it.

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11)

It's time to finish. Jesus began with twelve disciples. He had chosen them all Himself individually and personally. One of them betrayed Him and His Life "ended" so to speak on a Cross. But God knew what He was doing. He always knows what He is doing. He is not a defeated God. He never was and He never will be.

You know these disciples were kind of slow starters. When Jesus died they were scared out of their wits and hid themselves away behind locked doors. Then in the Gospel of John 20:19-20 we read,

"On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord."

Their Lord had died and they had been in despair. They weren't even talking of the way forward; but then they saw Jesus, the resurrected Lord and then the Spirit came. This group of 11 basically very different people but individually and collectively very frightened people were completely transformed, completely transformed. The church of God was born and grew. We read about it in the Acts of the Apostles; but I think that that is what we may be about to experience here in Blackburn. With God's help and in God's time.

His eye is upon us, his arm over over us, his ear open to our prayer, his grace is sufficient and his promises unchangeable." BUT, it all depends on how big your God, and my God, is. Amen.'

We close as we are invited to stand and say together:

'Now to him who is able to keep you from stumbling and to make you stand in the presence of his glory blameless with great joy, to the only God our Saviour, through Jesus Christ our Lord, be glory, majesty, dominion and authority, before all time, now and forever, and now may the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with us evermore. Amen.'
