Joy now shares our Bible passage for today: Psalm 16, verse 1-11.

"Keep me safe, my God,

It is still a cause for anxiousness, it might be due to the illness itself, but it could be the isolation of those living on their own, the fear of going out again and mixing with others, it could be the worry about jobs and possible redundancies and all the frightening consequences comes with re-opening.

Colin brings his sermon: The Joy of the Lord.

Christianity is a joyful religion. That's why the Apostle Paul declares to the Philippian Christians: 'Rejoice in the Lord always; and again I say, rejoice!' Jesus was a joyful person. In John 15, Jesus told the disciples that everything He taught them was so that His joy would be in them and their joy would be full. This is no mere happiness that is based on happy circumstances, but a deep sense of inner delight and contentment that is derived from a state of blessing and being blessed.

So, as the followers of Jesus, do we feel this morning that spirit of joy in our lives? Do we know and experience that sense of exuberance that transcends the drudgery and decay that surrounds us in our bodies and in our world?

Let us examine our topic this morning, 'The Joy of the Lord', through three headings.



The Joy of the Lord is My Strength

In Nehemiah 8:10 we read 'Now go home and have a feast. Share your food and wine with those who don't have enough. Today is holy to our Lord, so don't be sad. The joy that the Lord gives you will make you strong' (GNB). In other words: 'The joy of the LORD is your strength.'

You are strong today because the joy of the Lord is your strength. You see, Nehemiah was a reluctant leader who God used to restore Israel and rebuild the city of Jerusalem. The people had been forced into exile because of their sin. Nehemiah gathered the people together, and the priest read the scriptures. The Children of God had gone a long time without hearing God's word. When they heard the word, they responded in sorrow, weeping, and mourning. Then Nehemiah stood before the people and gave them a strange command. He told them to stop weeping. He said, go, eat, and celebrate. Don't be sorrowful, but be joyful for the joy of the Lord is your strength. They were to celebrate because God had brought about forgiveness and restoration.

This is also true for us as Christians. We have received God's mercy and forgiveness. We know in our own experience the meaning of John 3.16. God is joyful over our repentance and returning to Him. Think about the Parable of the Prodigal Son in Luke 15.

As a child of God, he takes delight in us. I have three children, and they are the joy of my life. I am proud of what they have achieved, sometimes in trying circumstances and I love bragging about them to others. Just as a human father is joyful and takes pride in his children, so God is joyful and takes great pride in his children – in you and me! God's joy over us gives us strength and courage to face tomorrow. His joy lives in us and gives us a delight that is beyond understanding. You see, our joy is not dependent on our material circumstances. This joy comes from an inner peace knowing all is well with us and God. Joy is the confidence that God is working for our good. Joy lifts our heart from sorrow to celebration, thanksgiving, and worship. The joy of the Lord is our strength today.

The Joy of the Lord is My Salvation

Do you remember when you became a Christian? You were filled with joy at coming to know Jesus as your Saviour and Friend in a deeply personal way. That same joy is not only available to you today but is God's will for your life. It is his will that we delight in his Son; that he is precious to us; that we are thrilled to bits that we are his and he is ours. Every day His desire is that we would know His joy in our hearts in such a way that it becomes obvious to people around us — especially those who live with us!

But with everything that has happened in the last 15 months and more, and possibly even with other things that have happened in your life as the years have gone by, joy may be the last quality that you would seek to entertain. And yet the promise of God's word is that joy is something God can restore. Psalm 51:12 says 'Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and uphold me with a willing spirit.' You see, God can cause our hearts to smile even if things on the outside seem to be falling apart. Because the sort of joy we are talking about here is not based on the outward things around us, but is something that can only be found in Christ the focus of God's presence. The Psalmist says: 'You make known to me the path of life; in your presence there is fullness of joy; at your right hand are pleasures forevermore' (Psalm 16.11). Christ is at God's right and he is the source of our eternal joy and gladness. The more we spend time with our Saviour and Friend the more our spirits will be exhilarated by such intimate fellowship.

So, if we lack joy, let us make a determined effort to spend time in God's presence. Let us enter his gates with thanksgiving, consider his incredible loving-kindness toward us in Jesus, and celebrate how great and glorious God is and we will experience his joy.

You see, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ wants every one of his children to experience joy to the full! We know this because of his word recorded in John 15:11: 'I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete.' Notice when it was that Jesus spoke these words. It was a strange time to talk about joy, for soon he would be in dark Gethsemane. Shortly after that he would be facing His accusers and hearing the taunts and mocking of those who hated him, and then he would be crucified. In the face of all this he spoke of 'my joy'! and it is significant that so far as the scriptural records are concerned this is the only time that he spoke of his joy. How unique this joy must have been if it still remained with him in his time of greatest trial and testing! The Lord's provision for all His children is that his joy should be their joy 'that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete.' We have this joy through the indwelling power of the

Holy Spirit. For joy is the second fruit of the Spirit after love! And out of joy flows a peace that passes all understanding, for Christ is the Prince of Peace.

My Song

We have said that the Christian faith is a religion of joy. And because it is a joyous religion, it is also a religion of song and dance. The phrases 'song of joy' and 'shout for joy' are found repeatedly in the Psalms, the book of sacred songs, enthusing the reader to 'sing to the LORD a new song!' (96.1) and to sing with unrestrained enthusiasm and a wide-range of musical instruments (150). Paul's rallying cry to the Church at Colossae is: 'Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom, teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord' (Colossians 3.16). I love that incident in Acts 16 where we find Paul and Silas in the darkest and dankest prison imaginable and yet they were so filled with Christ's own joy that they could sing praises to God at midnight! And all the other inmates listened, absolutely Gob-smacked. They'd never seen anything like this before!

And in the last book of the Bible, the Book of Revelation, and chapter 5, we find a vision of heaven and innumerable hosts of angelic beings singing the beatific equivalent of Handel's 'Hallelujah Chorus' in praise of the Lamb. The jokey image of Christians in the next life dressed in white, sitting on clouds and playing harps might indeed be ridiculous and a mockery of true heavenly bliss, but at least it captures one great truth: that making sweetmusic is a celestial reality.

But then you might ask: what have we got to sing about? My answer is found in two verses, one from Peter and one from Paul. In 1 Peter 1:8 we read: 'Though you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy.' And in 2 Corinthians 9:15, Paul declares: 'Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift.'

In these verses, we find God's indescribable gift and our inexpressible and glorious joy. God's incredible gift is Jesus. The fact, that God gave Jesus, leaves us unable to declare its wonder. Our inexpressible joy is joy so full it defies description.

Let us look just for the moment at Peter's words 'you believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy.' What an incredible statement! These believers had never seen Jesus, as Peter did, yet they were able to love Jesus and rejoice in Christ with indescribable joy. They were experiencing persecution and had been scattered abroad. How could they have indescribable joy? Because they were born-again (1 Peter 1:3) He tells them: 'Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.'

This ought to be the main reason Christians rejoice in the Lord. Notice that Peter tells his readers that their joy is based on the fact that they had a lively hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. As Tim reminded us two weeks ago, this hope is the hope of living again. This life is not all there is. There is a real place called heaven, and if you are saved, you are going there. In 1 Corinthians 15, the great resurrection chapter, we read, 'If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied' (v19). You see, some at Corinth were clearly saying that even if the resurrection is

not true, they were glad for the life they were living as a Christian. But Paul tells them 'not so'. He said those who hope only in this life are most to be pitied. My friends, we have a home beyond the river! As Peter says: we have 'an inheritance that is incorruptible and undefiled, and that fades not away, reserved in heaven.' As well as our heavenly inheritance in Christ being imperishable and free from anything that will deform or debase it, it is also unfading. This word is taken from the name of a flower, the amaranth. This



flower always comes back! Our inheritance may be covered by the cold winter's frost and snow, but it will always be there! Our inheritance in heaven is reserved for us. This means that God personally attends to our inheritance very carefully. He takes it upon Himself personally to look after it on our behalf. Jesus promised, 'Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also' (John 14:1-3).

Our final hymn today is a modern setting of a familiar psalm, The Lord's my Shepherd. This version has a refrain, generally sung by men and then echoed by female voices, but if you are reading this at home you can sing whichever part you wish!
