Bible Reading from Jane: Letter of James 4: 1-6

What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you? You desire but do not have, so you kill. You covet but you cannot get what you want, so you quarrel and fight. You do not have because you do not ask God. When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures.

You adulterous people, don't you know that friendship with the world means enmity against God? Therefore, anyone who chooses to be a friend of the world becomes an enemy of God. Or do you think Scripture says without reason that he jealously longs for the spirit he has caused to dwell in us? But he gives us more grace. That is why Scripture says: 'God opposes the proud but shows favour to the humble.'

Message

GRACE TO THE HUMBLE

I hope we have become wiser during the last seven days! For last week we talked about the wisdom that comes from heaven and about what that wisdom is like! How did we get on last week with being pure, peaceful, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere? Challenging isn't it!

I think for all of us this journey through the letter of James is a little like going to the dentist. Maybe one of us here this morning is a dentist so I apologise but you will understand what I mean. We come together in the waiting room wondering whether everything is OK with our teeth and our gums or knowing because of the pain that we are feeling that something definitely is not right but we are not sure what it is and how the dentist is going to sort it and perhaps also we wonder how long it is going to take and how much it is going to cost?

Actually if I end today's message at this point and we all go home and apply these points about going to the dentist to let him or her examine our teeth and gums and mouths, telling us where the pain is coming from and what he or she is going to do about that for us, explaining how long that will take and how much that will cost; if we apply these things to allowing God to open up our hearts and minds to what needs to be done in our lives with Him and with others we might never get round to lunch, Friday's lunch!

In these messages from the letter of James I have been trying with God's leading and encouragement and help to balance carefully the challenges and the encouragements and appealing to you to read the letter for yourselves. It is a personal letter about personal behaviour, about our individual ways of thinking as well as about our life together as the body of Christ, for this letter offers intensely practical help for the people of God.

Humility is a key element in this letter as it should be in our lives as individual believers and as a church. We shouldn't be proud of our humility but we should reflect and model the pattern of the Lord Jesus Christ. As we know from that great passage in Phil. 2: 5-11 our attitude should be the same as

that of Christ Jesus, who being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be held on to, but made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness and being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death, even death on a cross.

How was he able to do that? Because he trusted his Father and also because chose willingly to do what his Father told him to do.

The diagnosis which he had been given was the need of the whole of mankind whom he had made and sustains daily to be set free from death caused by their going their own way and making a completely hopeless ongoing mess of their lives. Mankind had ignored the plan; it had ignored the Maker; it had gone its own way on its own self-created, self-orientated, one track cul-de-sac to self- destruction.

The treatment which he recognised, understood and followed was that he himself, our Maker and Creator, should give up holding on to his status and rights, to come to earth as a man to live and die to get the issue sorted once and for all. Through His death on the Cross our sins are forgiven, through his resurrection from the dead we have received new life. Presuming of course we ask his forgiveness, turn away from our wicked ways, give up everything and follow him.

If anyone is in Christ he is a new creation; the old has passed away; all things have become new. The old has gone, the new is here! (2. Cor. 5:17)

Is that what our lives look like?

Do we understand what it means to be humble?

The presence of humility in our lives working itself out on the basis of the wisdom that comes from heaven, the wisdom of God, is something very special.

It is not like what we heard from the beginning of chapter 4 with lives full of unfulfilled desires and restlessness, spewing out quarrels and fights like the ash of an exploding volcano at any time and at any place and at anybody and everybody.

If we are humble we know that God knows best. I often say to you God knows, God cares, trust Him which he does and we can. If we are humble we know our lives on the earth are short and our days are numbered. As James himself says in this fourth chapter, "You do not even know what will happen tomorrow: What is your life? You are a mist that appears here for a little while and then vanishes. "(4:14) We say, "if it is the Lord's Will, we will live and do this or that." (4:15b)

If on the other hand we are proud, we think we are in charge of our destiny, in charge of our lives. We may even from an early age develop a bucket list full and becoming overfull of things we want to do before we cease to exist as we might think we will. We think we will do this and that tomorrow.

In Luke 12: 16-21 Jesus talked about it like this.

He told them this story: "The ground of a certain rich man yielded an abundant harvest. He thought to himself, 'What shall I do? I have no place to store my crops.' "Then he said, 'This is what I'll do. I will tear down my barns and build bigger ones, and there I will store my surplus grain. And I'll say to myself, "You have plenty of grain laid up for many years. Take life easy; eat, drink and be merry." "But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?' "This is how it will be with whoever stores up things for themselves but is not rich toward God."

James is writing to believers who are aiming to follow the Lord but struggling; who perhaps want to love God and love themselves at the same time, who perhaps want to have it both ways, who are as

we frequently say sitting on the fence, choosing that from the Bible which suits them but leaving out or ignoring or watering down the rest.

Solid joys and lasting treasure belong to those who follow the Lord with all their heart, soul, mind and strength. A dissatisfied heart is never at peace with God or with others or with itself with an internal selfish orientation to that which is against God. You cannot sit on the fence for ever. What is within us makes itself clear amongst us.

We are in the world but not of it. We are not to love not the world neither the things that are in the world. James 4:4 1 John 2: 15-17 John's Gospel 17:15-16 John 15:15

Re-read: James 4:1-3

In some instances we don't pray at all.

In other cases our motivation is probably wrong.

Is our prayer a genuine expression of our submission to God and His Word or not? Do our prayers let God be God?

God hears the prayers of those who call upon him in truth, (Psalm 145:18)

Do we say with St. Augustine: "O Lord, make me pure, but not yet!"

Are we asking in the wrong spirit; do we only want to satisfy our own wishes and desires?

"O God fix this please, please, please; but not in a way that challenges me, not in a way that is painful for me, that doesn't suit me and my personal life goals or in a way that is too costly for me."

"Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.'" (Luke 18:10-12)

"But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.' (Luke 10:13)

The Lord hears the cries of those who come to Him admitting they are wrong and seeking God's mercy and forgiveness.

"Out of the depths I cry to you, Lord; Lord, hear my voice. Let your ears be attentive to my cry for mercy. If you, Lord, kept a record of wrongs, Lord, who could stand? But with you there is forgiveness, so that we can, with reverence, serve you. I wait for the Lord, my whole being waits, and in his word I put my hope" (Psalm 130:5)

Let's not pray about something unless we really mean it when we are praying. Let's not pray to God to sort our lives out if we don't really want that and God knows that anyway!

Are we saying prayers as a routine or are we praying from the heart? Shirley talked about fervent prayers last week. Do we know what they are? They are not dry, routine, cold, half-hearted apologies from a stony heart but passionate, warm, intense, and enthusiastic cries from hearts that are on fire with the Lord where the Spirit is leading, guiding, comforting and empowering. Do the feelings of our hearts go with us?

Are we a walking contradiction, partly truth and partly fiction or are we genuine? Are we living authentic lives? God who searches our hearts knows where we are, he knows what we think, he knows

what we feel, he knows what motivates us and what doesn't; and this should be a great encouragement to us.

Do we bring our lives before God because we want him to sort them out?

We may be or may be not official members of a particular local church, in our case of Blackburn Baptist Church. But if we have set Jesus Christ as the Lord of our hearts we are not just usually accepted into formal membership of a local fellowship, which is nevertheless a great thing to do and I would strongly recommend you to seek the Lord as to whether you should apply formally to become a member at BBC, but it is way, way more than that. It is in so to speak a different dimension. Do you know why? Do you know in what way?

Do you know what happens and has happened when we give or gave our lives back to God? We have been and are being and will be organically creatively woven into the embroidery of the Godhead of the Lord Jesus Christ. We are part of His Kingdom. Hallelujah! We are being transformed together into the image of the living God in Jesus Christ His Son, through our interactions with one another, through the sharing of our God-given gifts for the establishment of His Kingdom here in Blackburn. Now! We are not parts of an organisation for its own sake but as a demonstration of the power of God in the lives of men and women. We live, grow and mature as a church in God's Name, to His honour and glory and for His sake, showing organic growth served by a flexible and God-designed and approved organisational structure.

GOD IS AT WORK IN US! (Phil. 2:13)

Do we have a heart for God? Yes! But do we have the heart of God? We are His alone; He is passionately jealous for us, He yearns after us, He pursues us, He follows us, He will do all it will take to persevere with us; BECAUSE HE LOVES US WITH AN EVERLASTING LOVE. He sometimes allows us to get into a threatening quagmire of a life situation until we cry to Him from our hearts to pull us out. He hears our call; He hears our cries; He rescues us from the miry clay and sets our feet upon a rock.

Do we have the heart of God to share this message with those with whom we are in contact, with those with whom we engage? How they need to hear this message even today and we, all of us, are the messengers. Say yes to sharing the message of forgiveness and new life in Jesus today with at least one other person each day. You will be amazed at how God can enable you to share and at how He has prepared hearts to hear what you say and to see what you do.

There is just one more thing I need to say. It is quite devastating and equally destructive for the human heart to hear only negative things. This applies to pastors and ministers probably as much as anyone else. This letter of James can be so soul-destroying to those who see the dark side of everything, even to those whose half-full cup seems empty rather than full.

So, and you might think this is a kind of protest vote on my part, which it may be, but in what I think is more a tactical vote in support of those who are frequently depressed and anxious by bad news, negative headlines and the like, I close with the following words from Phil. 4:8: "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things."

God gives grace to the humble.
