Here I am to worship.....



#### Colin led in prayer:

## Colin shares some thoughts:

The meaning and purpose of life is Christ because he alone is the source of eternal life. We were created to have a relationship with our Creator, to glorify him and enjoy him, and find pleasure in him, for ever. For the kingdom of God is not about food and drink, or fashion and clothing, but about righteousness, joy and peace in Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit.

We also ask that all nations live in harmony and tranquillity, remembering the stampede in Seoul Korea last night; please, Lord, heal the suffering and sorrow of all mankind. We pray for countries in West Africa that are currently ravaged by flood and that are battling with loss of lives and properties that you replenish and bless them. We remember those children who are abused and frightened, who rely on drugs, angry and confused all the time. We pray this morning for the world in general, Heavenly Father, countries where there are

shortages of food and water, where sanitation is non-existent and quality hospital treatment.

There is anxiety for the safety of our young people as there is so much avoidable violence in our world today, we pray about the situation with guns and knives. Lord, we ask you to intervene in all this danger, and we pray for your peace that surpasses all understanding to reign again.

#### Colin read from Matthew 5, 14-16, from the Sermon on the Mount:

"You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven."

## Colin shared his message: Lighthouse Keeper

"Thinking about my job-description this morning, I am reminded of a children's chorus we used to sing here at Bethesda:

Be a Lighthouse for Jesus, be a Lighthouse shining bright, send the beacon out in the land of doubt, and so, be a light for him.

For 'doubt' we could equally substitute the word 'darkness', though I guess the song wouldn't rhyme quite so well. When you look at the news, you cannot escape horrifying anger, crime, terror, disease and war, and even the threat of nuclear war. Politics is dark. Entertainment is dark. Social media is dark. And if the court case in Manchester, involving a certain neonatal nurse, is anything to go by, our hospitals can also be dark. And with all this going on around us, we could be tempted, I guess, to cry out to God, 'Where are you in all this darkness? We need light!' If we did so, I'm sure God would wrap his everlasting arms around us, look us in the eye and say, in the words of Jesus from our reading this morning: 'You are the light of the world.... (So) let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify me.' In other words, we are to be a light set on a hill; a light for all the world to see; in short, a lighthouse that shines forth in the darkness. In the darkness of crime, terror and disease, we are the light. In the darkness of modern politics, entertainment and social media, we are the light. It's not that we ought to be the

light. It's that we are the light. And, according to Jesus in our reading, we are meant to shine by doing good works that glorify God.

But what does Jesus mean in our reading from Matthew 5 by our 'good works'? In his first letter to the Thessalonian Christians, Saint Paul declares to the Christians: 'We always thank God for all of you and continually mention you in our prayers. We remember before our God and Father your work of faith, your labour of love, and your steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ.' Here, Paul refers to three kinds of 'good works': the good-work of faith; the good-work of love; and the good-work of hope - all based on our Lord Jesus Christ.

You see, Paul constantly kept this Christian community he had founded very much in his heart. So, it was with deep affection that he remembered these three lights that shone in their lives. The apostle knew these spiritual qualities can only shine in lives that are being lived on the wavelength of the Risen Christ, walking in Spirit and truth, and doing the works of God through his grace and supernatural power which he supplies in abundance. Let us consider these three qualities and apply them in our own lives as believers in the Lord.

Paul refers first of all to the good-work of faith, or the works of faith. These were not the dead works of the Law of Moses, or any system of religious rule-keeping. A work of faith can only be accomplished through the power of the indwelling Spirit of Christ. God has prepared good works for each of us to do, but these tasks can only be carried out as we submit to his leading and guidance.

You see, this faith is the spiritual foundation upon which all spiritual work is anchored. (Think about the Parable of the Wise and Foolish Builders. The Rock was Christ and his Word.) Their faith was a sanctifying or purifying faith, the type of faith Saint James challenged his readers with when he wrote, 'show me your faith without your works, and I will show you my faith by my works.' It is always important to identify whether a passage relates to initial salvation (what we call 'justification') or ongoing salvation as a believer progresses in the faith, which the Bible calls 'sanctification' - the act of becoming more holy or godly, more Christ-like, which is what the word 'saint' means.

Tuesday is All Saints Day. Whereas some Christians celebrate the lives of certain saints or special people, like Saint Peter or Saint Paul, the Bible actually teaches that all people in Christ are special because all are special to him and have been gifted with his Spirit. So, all people who name the Name of Christ as their Saviour and Lord are called to be saints - to be Christ-like. So, on Tuesday, we can, of course, celebrate the work that Christ has done through some remarkable people, both in the past and present, but we can also rejoice in the fact that we are also sainted in Christ and are special in him and chosen for his service. But the question is: are we living to please our Lord and Saviour or to please ourselves?

So, faith that justifies is a work of the Spirit in the heart of a person who has trusted in Christ as their Saviour. This salvation is based on his finished work on the Cross. Faith that justifies takes place at one moment in time, when we place our trust

in Christ. When a sinner is born-again, their faith in Christ is reckoned by God as righteousness. They are justified - just as if they had never sinned. However, the ongoing faith that sanctifies, is the work of faith that Paul praises in that verse - the work of faith the Thessalonians had in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Sanctification is a work of faith which takes time to grow and mature. It is the faith that translates into good works that honour the Lord. An ongoing sanctification process takes place as the Holy Spirit works the work of God through our lives. In other words, a 'work of faith' is a righteous act of God which He carries out through us because of our faith in Christ. When our faith rests on him, the work we produce is Christ working through us.

Our second 'good work' is the **labour of love**. The love of these Thessalonian Christians was not a fluctuating, emotional love, or love based on sentimental feelings, and changing circumstances. Instead, their love of the Lord was a sacred bond of genuine praise and thanksgiving for all that God has done for them, through Christ. This kind of love is the denial of our ego, our self-life, the desire to please ourselves. Instead, it is a deep desire to do only that which honours the Lord.

For this labouring in love is prompted by the knowledge that all we are and all we have is from the Lord. The more we know of God's goodness and grace towards us the more we are prompted to labour in love for the Lord. When we begin to consider the enormity of what God has done for us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died on the Cross for us, the more we are prompted to labour in love for Him.

The Church is the Body of Christ; an incarnation of love in and through the Spirit of the Living Lord Jesus. He made it very clear that the clearest demonstration of the power of the gospel to save is the love of Christians for their Lord and for each other. Jesus said, 'By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another.' This is a love that transcends all the barriers and barricades that the world around us will put up to try to limit our freedom in Christ. But sadly, Christians are good at following the world's agenda by helping the opposition to erect those same barriers of division within our churches. You see, divide and conquer has always been the Devil's strategy.

The third **Good Work** of the Thessalonians was the steadfastness or persistence of their future hope in the Lord Jesus. His many precious promises and the blessed expectation of his soon return was not founded on empty optimism or a fingers-crossed-wishful-thinking attitude. It is the unshakable confidence in the knowledge that God's Word is true. And though we may have to wait for His return - it will certainly come. But in the meantime, as Paul says, 'For me to live is Christ and to die is gain.' 'For to be away from the body' is to be 'at home with the Lord'. When with perseverance, we hope in the Lord and stand firm on the promises of God, we have an inner-assurance in His Word. Indeed, our steadfast hope in the Lord is the unshakable conviction that what we read in his Word is God-breathed or God-spoken to us as unique individuals who are precious in his sight.

May we follow in the footsteps of the Christians of Thessalonica whose good works were energised by faith, whose service was motivated by love, and who maintained an

unwavering hope in the return of our Lord Jesus Christ. May our work of faith be actively dependent on Him. May our labour of love become a living sacrifice that honours our Father God in thought, word, and deed, and may the steadfastness of our hope in Christ Jesus our Lord, inspire others to follow our example. In other words, that they too will desire to be a clear beacon for Christ; a lighthouse that will shine forth the gospel of peace in a world that has lost its way and is groping around in the dark, trying to find some faith, love and hope for the future, both in this life and for the life to come.

I started with a children's song, and now I'm going to end with one; one I'm sure you will all recognise:

This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine.

This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine.

This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine,

let it shine, let it shine, oh let it shine."

As we bring our service to a close, Colin invited us to sing again, once more with Alec playing the piano:

Longing for light, we wait in darkness. Longing for truth, we turn to you.

Make us your own, your holy people, light for the world to see.

Christ, be our light! Shine in our hearts. Shine through the darkness.

Christ, be our light! Shine in your church gathered today.

Longing for peace, our world is troubled. Longing for hope, many despair.

Your word alone has power to save us. Make us your living voice.

Make us your building, sheltering others, walls made of living stone.
