Sharing Christ's Great Banquet

Alec began by welcoming everyone, especially Tim Presswood, President of the Baptist Union this year, to lead our time of worship together. Tim shared that his Presidential Message was The Great Banquet, following on from Hayley Young, who had invited us to build a bigger table. Tim had arrived on his motorbike, and was wearing a suit and shoes unlike when he was inducted as President when he was barefoot!

Tim issued a Call to Worship:

Gather us in, young and old, rich and poor, black and white. Gather us in, doubtful and faithful, weak and strong, healthy and sick. Gather us in, into your harvest, into your presence, into your church. Gather us in, today and tomorrow, as yesterday and forever. Gather us in. Amen.

Tim apologised if there were a number of unfamiliar songs today, one of the challenges of leading worship in different churches is you don't know what songs they know! We began with this, played by Trevor, Paul W, Kate and Judith.

Let us build a house where love can dwell and all can safely live, a place where saints and children tell how hearts learn to forgive. Built of hopes and dreams and visions, rock of faith and vault of grace; here the love of Christ shall end divisions: All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place.

Let us build a house where prophets speak, and words are strong and true, where all God's children dare to seek to dream God's reign anew. Here the cross shall stand as witness and as symbol of God's grace; here as one we claim the faith of Jesus: All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place.

Let us build a house where love is found in water, wine, and wheat: a banquet hall on holy ground where peace and justice meet. Here the love of God, through Jesus, is revealed in time and space; as we share in Christ the feast that free us: All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place.

Let us build a house where hands will reach beyond the wood and stone to heal and strengthen, serve and teach, and live the Word they've known. Here the outcast and the stranger bear the image of God's face; let us bring an end to fear and danger: All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place.

Let us build a house where all are named, their songs and visions heard and loved and treasured, taught and claimed as words within the Word. Built of tears and cries and laughter, prayers of faith and songs of grace,

let this house proclaim from floor to rafter:

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We all said the Lord's Prayer, before Jean read our first Bible passage for this morning: Luke 14:15-24 When one of those at the table with him heard this, he said to Jesus, "Blessed is the one who will eat at the feast in the kingdom of God."

Tony then came reminding us of the weekly notices, before Jane read a statement re Future Ministry, You can read it at the end of this service sheet. Tim felt it appropriate to lead a time of prayer, first in silence, following this, before inviting Jean to return and read our second Bible passage:

Reading 2 John 10:6-10

Jesus used this figure of speech, but the Pharisees did not understand what he was telling them.

Therefore Jesus said again, "Very truly I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who have come before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep have not listened to them. I am the gate; whoever enters through me will be saved. They will come in and go out, and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.

Reflection - Tim. He first introduced himself, for those who did not know him, he has been in Baptist Ministry for 32 years, in the same church, in Openshaw, one of the most deprived areas of the country. He was called to join NWBA 10 years ago, to his surprise, working alongside Phil Jump, and is also College Manager at Northern Baptist College. The church in Manchester is now a Forest Church, worshipping God in creation, demonstrating that there are many different ways of "doing" church.

He explained that for him, poetry is an important way of communicating the Gospel, and encourages the congregation to think -today is a mad poetic ramble! This is his reflection in writing, so may lose something of the pattern and cadence of the spoken word.

Openshaw, where I live and minister, is one of the most deprived communities in the country. Before our building was pulled down, we suffered from a number of very unpleasant incidents, not least of which was the occasion when an old lady in her eighties was sitting in the car while her son locked the building, and the car was surrounded by a gang of hooligans who started to shake the car, threatening to turn it over with her inside. Understandably, the congregation were afraid and surrounded the church with high fences and gates which were painted with anti-vandal paint and which were locked ten minutes after the Sunday service started.

Until one Sunday when a young couple who were not members of the church came to see whether they wanted to get married in our church. Finding the gates locked, and having called out to be let in, they, perhaps unwisely, decided to climb over the gate. Such keenness to get into church! Covered in sticky anti-vandal paint, they decided to get married somewhere else.

In John 10, Jesus is not a wall!

24-02-24 - Notice for Church – Future Ministry

As we approach a crucial time in the life of this church, I've been asked to speak to you as we want everyone to be fully informed and involved. As most of you will know, Alec's contract finishes at the end of October and we must consider future ministry. With the support of the deacons, Alec has made it clear that he feels sure that God is calling him to continue to serve at BBC, although possibly in a part-time way alongside another part-time worker, perhaps a student minister or someone else who feels called to work in an area such as Galligreaves and the surrounding communities. However, the church also has to discern what God is saying.

As the leadership team, we have committed ourselves to fasting and praying every Wednesday, starting last week, throughout Lent during the weeks up to Easter and we have invited the whole church to join with us, including the prayer meeting here at Bethesda at 7.30pm every Wednesday evening when everyone is welcome; if you are unable to come to church, please pray in your own homes.

In addition, the deacons are very grateful to those who have come forward to serve on a working group to look into various options for future ministry. At the group's meeting last Wednesday, it became clear that before looking at specific ministry, as a church we needed to decide what our hopes and dreams for the future are, what do we believe God wants us to become, what should be happening in this building that the Lord has so graciously given us, and how does He want us to serve one another and the community surrounding us? These are not questions a small group of people should decide but are questions for the whole fellowship. We concluded that the only way such a diverse group of believers, each with our own preferences and experiences, could do this is for each one of us individually to purposefully, intentionally, single-mindedly and expectantly to draw near to the Lord, claiming the promise: 'Draw near to God and He will draw near to you.'

A very familiar verse from 2 Chron. 7:14: 'If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, [and can any one of us say that we are not drawn away from God by the things of the world?] then [God says] I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land.' (Heal their church, heal their community, heal their town, heal their country! But it has to start with us! As Paul writes to the Philippian church: 'Forgetting what is behind [in recent years, 20 years ago, 50 years ago?] and straining towards what is ahead ... I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me ...) (Phil. 3:12-14)

The apostle Paul instructs the church in Rome to 'present your bodies as living sacrifices ... this is your spiritual act of worship ... be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is – his good, pleasing and perfect will.' Isn't that what we each need to do? But how do we do it? I offer a suggestion as a starting point: 'My Lordship Prayer' leaflet (kindly brought by Gwynneth to the Ladies' Bible Study last week). If we were all to earnestly begin our prayers every day with this prayer and look intently into His word, do you not think that our Lord would hear from heaven and answer?

The time is short. Next Sunday, after the Communion Service, we will be having our monthly 'Bring and Share' Lunch (a week earlier than usual) and after that we will be having a special meeting to which we would like everyone in the fellowship to attend, if at all possible. Then we will have the opportunity to pray together and in small groups to discuss, to share our hopes and dreams and say what we believe the Lord is telling us as His body in this place. If we know Jesus as our Lord and Saviour, then, by His Holy Spirit He is able to speak to and through any one of us and corporately to reveal to us His plan for the future of BBC.

May the Lord bless each one of us richly as we come before Him this week.
